Ventura County DA CA Policy Manual

Military Equipment

703.1 PURPOSE AND SCOPE

The purpose of this policy is to provide guidelines for the approval, acquisition, and reporting requirements of military equipment (Government Code § 7071; Government Code § 7072).

703.1.1 DEFINITIONS

Definitions related to this policy include (Government Code § 7070)

Governing body – The Ventura County Board of Supervisors which is the elected body that oversees the Ventura County District Attorney's Office.

Military equipment – Includes but is not limited to the following.

- Unmanned, remotely piloted, powered aerial or ground vehicles.
- Mine-resistant ambush-protected (MRAP) vehicles or armored personnel carriers.
- High mobility multipurpose wheeled vehicles (HMMW) two-and-one-half-ton trucks, five-ton trucks on theeled vehicles that have abreaching or entry apparatus attached.
- Tracked are fored velicles that provide ballistic protestion to their occupants.
- Command and control yehicles that are either built or modified to facilitate the operational control and direction of public safety units.
- Weaponized aircraft, vessels, or vehicles of any kind.
- Battering rame slugs, and breaching opparatuses that are explosive in nature. This does not include a handled, one-person ram.
- Greatms and amhunition of caliber or greater, excluding standard-issue shotguns and standard-issue shotgun ammunition.
- Specialized firearms and ammunition of less than .50 caliber, including firearms and accessore sidentified as assault weapons in Penal Code § 30510 and Penal Code § 30515, with the exception of standard-issue firearms.
- Any firearm or hearm accessory that is designed to launch explosive projectiles.
- Noise-flash diversionary devices and explosive breaching tools.
- Munitions containing tear gas or OC, excluding standard, service-issued handheld pepper spray.
- TASER® Shockwave, microwave weapons, water cannons, and long-range acoustic devices (LRADs).
- Kinetic energy weapons and munitions.
- Any other equipment as determined by a governing body or a state agency to require additional oversight.

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703.2 POLICY

It is the policy of the Ventura County District Attorney's Office that members of this office comply with the provisions of Government Code § 7071 with respect to military equipment.

703.3 MILITARY EQUIPMENT COORDINATOR

The Chief Investigator should designate a member of this office to act as the military equipment coordinator. The responsibilities of the military equipment coordinator include but are not limited to:

- (a) Acting as liaison to the governing body for matters related to the requirements of this policy.
- (b) Identifying Bureau of Investigation equipment that callifies as military equipment in the current possession of the Ventura County Cisrict Atomey's Office, or the equipment the Ventura County District Attorney's Cifre intends to acquire that requires approval by the governing body.
- (c) Conducting an inventory of all milhars equipment at least annually.
- (d) Collaborating with any allied agency that may use military equipment within the jurisdiction of the Ventura County District Vitoria Volume (Government Code § 7071).
- (e) Preparing for, scheduling and coordinating the annual community engagement meeting to include:
 - Publicizing the details of the meeting
 - 2. Preparing for public questions regarding the Ventura County District Attorney's Office funding, acquisition, and use of equipment.
- (f) Preparing the annual number of report for submission to the Chief Investigator and ensuring that the report is made available on the Ventura County District at the report of the South State (County District Property of the South State (County
- Establishing the procedure for a parson to register a complaint or concern, or how that person may submit a question about the use of a type of military equipment, and how the Ventura County District Attorney's Office will respond in a timely manner.

703.4 MILITARY EQUIPMENT NVENTORY

The following constitutes a list of qualifying equipment for the Ventura County District Attorney's Office:

703.5 APPROVAL

The Chief Investigator or the authorized designee shall obtain approval from the governing body by way of an ordinance adopting the military equipment policy. As part of the approval process, the Chief Investigator or the authorized designee shall ensure the proposed military equipment policy is submitted to the governing body and is available on the Ventura County District Attorney's Office website at least 30 days prior to any public hearing concerning the military equipment at issue

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(Government Code § 7071). The military equipment policy must be approved by the governing body prior to engaging in any of the following (Government Code § 7071):

- (a) Requesting military equipment made available pursuant to 10 USC § 2576a.
- (b) Seeking funds for military equipment, including but not limited to applying for a grant, soliciting or accepting private, local, state, or federal funds, in-kind donations, or other donations or transfers.
- (c) Acquiring military equipment either permanently or temporarily, including by borrowing or leasing.
- (d) Collaborating with another law enforcement agency in the deployment or other use of military equipment within the jurisdiction of this price.
- (e) Using any new or existing military equipment for a purpose, in a manner, or by a person not previously approved by the governing body.
- (f) Soliciting or responding to a proposal or, or entering into an agreement with, any other person or entity to seek funds for, apply to receive, acquire, use or collaborate in the use of military equipment.
- (g) Acquiring military equipment through any means not provided above.

703.6 COORDINATION WITH OTHER JURISDICTIONS

On occasion, the Ventura County District quired to assist or be assisted orney's se may b by other law enforcem es in a fol ent mutual aid request or in support on. In tho of day-to-day opera may be necessary for members al collabo o fulfill an igned mission. When this occurs, the following to utilize military equil nt in ord shall apply:

(a) Members of the Ventura County District Attorney's Office are required to adhere to this policy regardless of the operational jurisdiction.

703.7 ANNUAL REPORT

Upon approval of a military equipment paley, the Chief Investigator or the authorized designee should submit a military equipment report to the governing body for each type of military equipment approved within one war of approval, and annually thereafter for as long as the military equipment is available for use (Government Code § 7072).

The Chief Investigator of the authorized designee should also make each annual military equipment report publicly available on the Ventura County District Attorney's Office website for as long as the military equipment is available for use. The report shall include all information required by Government Code § 7072 for the preceding calendar year for each type of military equipment in the Ventura County District Attorney's Office inventory.

703.8 COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Within 30 days of submitting and publicly releasing the annual report, the Ventura County District Attorney's Office shall hold at least one well-publicized and conveniently located community

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engagement meeting, at which the Ventura County District Attorney's Office should discuss the report and respond to public questions regarding the funding, acquisition, or use of military equipment.

703.9 TEST AND EVALUATION OF MILITARY EQUIPMENT

While the department's current inventory of military equipment is wide ranging and versatile, advancement in technology, tactics, and operational effectiveness may necessitate the expansion or complete replacement of certain items of military equipment.

From time to time, certain equipment vendors and/or ma cturers may loan certain military equipment items to the Ventura County District Attorn e for testing by various units to conduct assessments of their products, this process referred to as "testing and evaluation." During this process, various units and ubject matter erts conduct assessments of the equipment to determine whether or not quipment should b ensidered for purchase. trict Attorney's Office In these circumstances, the Ventura County only use the loaned equipment in a training environment and will not lov anv ruipment tha inconsistent with this policy during enforcement action without the app Chief Investiga and the Board of Supervisors.

703.10 MILITARY EQUIPMENT INVESTORY

Unmanned, remotely pileted, powered actial or ground rehicles:

• Remotely piloted aerial vehicle (RRA) a remotely piloted aerial vehicle capable of providing the and recorded video mages captured from aerial positions.

<u>Firearms and ammunition of 50 caliber or greater, excluding standard-issue shotguns and standard-issue shotgun ammunition:</u>

Specialized firearms and ammunition of less than 50 caliber finding firearms and accessories identified as assault weapons in Penal Code § 30510 and Penal Code § 30515, with the exception of standard-issue handguns

- Rifle and Rifle Rounds: Shoulder mount of rifles under 50 caliber are designed to have greater accuracy over a longer distance than handguns.
 - Legal and Procedural Rules
 - Rifles and rifle ammunition shall only be used for office law enforcement purposes, and pursuant to the Ventura County District Amorney's Office Bureau of Investigation Lexipol Folio 300.
 - o Training:
 - Sworn Investigators utilized rifles and relations rounds are trained in their use with formalized instruction, including a California POST certified instruction course and regular lange qualifications.
 - Fisca Impact:
 - Approximately \$100 for each rifle; primarily consisting of repair and pur hase of additional rounds

Expected Life Span

- Disted Rifles: Approximately 15 years
- Listed Rifles Rounds: Approximately 20 years
- Purpose/Authorized Use:
 - Investigators may deploy a rifle when they believe a precision weapon is eeded to address a threat with greater accuracy from a distance or when addressing an armed subject.
- Description / Quantity / Purchase Cost / Capabilities:
 - Colt M4 LE6920 Carbine Rifles
 - Quantity: 10 (Purchased in 2018)
 - Approximately \$1,160 per unit
 - These semi-automatic rifles are equipped with iron sights and are capable of firing.
 - Colt M4 LE 6933 Short-Barrel Rifles

- Quantity: 5 (purchased in 2018)
- Approximately \$1,376 per unit
- These semi-automatic rifles are equipped with iron sights and are capable of firing 5.56mm and 223 caliber ammunition.
- Federal 5.56 Caliber 55 Grain Full Metal Jacket Rifle Rounds
 - Quantity: Approximately 42,000 rounds
 - Approximately \$170 per case
 - This ammunition is capable of being fired from a 5.56mm rifle platform.
- Speer Gold Dot.223 Caliber 55 Frain GLAN Rifle Rounds
 - Quantity: Approximately 5,000 rounds
 - Approximately \$270 per case
 - This ammunition is capable of boing fired from a 5.56mm or.223 rifle platform

- Pepperbal Launcher A non-leval device that discharges small hard plastic projectiles containing a powder chamical agent.
 - Description (Quantity / Runchase Cost / Capabilities:
 - Tippman Pepperball Launcher
 - Quantity: 2
 - Approximately \$350 per unit
 - The Tippman System is a compressed-air powered launcher designed to fire non-lethal pepperball projectiles.
 - Pepperball LIVE Projectile
 - Quantity: Approximately 200
 - Approximately \$2 per projectile
 - The projectile is designed for direct impact and contains PAVA pepper powder. Deployed using a pepperball launcher.
 - Purpose/Authorized Use:

- Less lethal tool used from a distance in order to compel potentially violent suspects to cease dangerous actions and comply with arrest.
 May also be used to compel specific individuals in a large, violent, and riotous crowd to disperse from an outdoor area.
- Expected Life Span:
 - Pepperball Launchers: Approximately 20 years
 - Pepperball Projectiles: Approximately 3 years
- Fiscal Impact:
 - Approximately \$100.00 annually primarily consisting of the cost to repair launchers and purchase of additional projectiles.
- Training:
 - Sworn members utilizing the pepperbal bunchers are trained in their use with formalized instruction. In addition, sworn members utilizing chemical a costs receive California P T certified training and recertification colors ever thee years.
- Legal and Procedural Rules
 - It is the the Ventu County District Attorney's Office to utilize unchers projectiles only for official law perb enforcemen urposes pursuant the Ventura County District Polig Use of orce, Policy 302 - Control rney's Of De es and Te State Federal law.

TASER® Shockwave, microwave peapons, water cannons, and long-range acoustic devices (LRADs):

Kinetic energy weapons and munitions:

40 MM Launchers and Rounds: A shoulder mounted launcher designed as a less lethal tool to launch inpact rounds.

Description / Quantity / Purchase Cost / Capabilities:

- Defense Technology LMT single 40mm Launcher
- Quantity: 1
- \$900 per unit
- This device is capable of firing a 40mm less lethal round.
- Defense Technology 40mm Impact Sponge Rounds
 - Quantity: 10
 - Approximately \$20 per unit

- A less lethal 40mm lightweight plastic and foam projectile capable of being fired from a single or multi-round 40mm launcher.
- Expected Life Span:
 - 40mm Launchers: Approximately 15 years
 - 40mm Rounds: Approximately 5 years
- Fiscal Impact:
 - 40mm Launchers: Approximately \$700 annually; primarily consisting of repair/part replacement.
 - 40mm Rounds: Approximately \$100 annually; consisting of the purchase of replacement rounds.
- Training:
 - Sworn members utilizing 40mm launcher and rounds are trained in their use with formalized instruction.

- Less bethal Sho gun and An munition: A shotgun used to deploy the less lethal
 12-gaunt Beanbar Round.
 - Description / Quantity / Purchase Cost / Capabilities:
 - Ramington 870 Less Lethal Shotgun
 - o Quantity: 3
 - Approximately \$400 per unit
 - The less lethal shotgun is used to deploy the less lethal 12gauge Super-Sock Beanbag Round up to a distance between five and 75 feet.
 - Defense Technology 12-Gauge Super-Sock Beanbag Round
 - Quantity: 50
 - Approximately \$6 per box of ammunition
 - o The round is a less lethal 12-gauge shotgun round made of a ballistic fiber bag filled with approximately 40 grams of lead shot that travels at a velocity of 270 to 290 feet per second.
 - Purpose/Authorized Use:

- Less lethal tools used from a distance in order to compel potentially violent suspects to cease dangerous actions and comply with arrest.
 May also be used to compel specific individuals in a large, violent, and riotous crowd to disperse from an outdoor area.
- Expected Life Span:
 - Remington 870 Less Lethal Shotgun: Approximately 25 years
 - Defense Technology Super-Sock Round: No listed expiration date
- Fiscal Impact:
 - Approximately \$200.00 annuals. The cost includes repair, part replacement and purchase of replacement beanbag rounds.
- Training:
 - Sworn members unliking a less lethal statement are trained in their use with formalized instruction, including a California POST certified instruction course a magnitude range qualifications.
- Legal and Precedural Rules
 - County District Attorney's Office to It is th of the Ven utilize le hotgun and s lethal rounds only for official law at to the Ventura County District and pursu enforceme purp e Policy Attorney's O Use of Exce; and Policy 301 – Control State and Federal law. ices and hniqu
- Shouldition: A fixed m/munition designed to be used for training of high risk and force on force incidents.
 - Description / Quantity / Purchase Cost / Capabilities:
 - Simunition Training Weapon
 - Currently the Ventura County District Attorney's Office does not ossess any simunition capable training weapons.
 - Sin unition Training Rounds
 - Quantity: Approximately 500 rounds
 - Approximately \$300 for a box of 500 rounds
 - The rounds are designed to be used with Simunition Conversion Rifle Bolts and Simunition handguns. The rounds are fired from the Simunition weapon system and are designed to be used for force-on-force training scenarios.
 - Purpose:
 - The items are used by law enforcement personnel for force-on-force training.
 - Authorized Use:

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- Law enforcement members attending simunition training are provided with a safety briefing and safety equipment. In addition, assigned safety officers are present during each of the scenario exercises. The device and rounds may only be used while under the supervision of an instructor assigned to instruct the course.
- Expected Life Span:
 - Simunition firearms and bolt conversion: Approximately 15 years
 - Simunition Training Rounds: 5 year
- Fiscal Impact:
 - Approximately \$650 annuals, primarily consisting of repair/ part replacement of simunition frearms and the purchase of simunition replacement rounds
- Training:
 - Sworn members unlizing the simunitions are trained in their use with formalized instruction.
- Legal and Procedural Rules
 - It is the policy of the Sheriff Office to utilize simunition only for official law enforcement purposes and pursuant to the Ventura County Sheriff's Office Policy 300 Use of Force, Ventura County Sheriff's Office Policy 202 Control Devices and Techniques, State and Pederal law
